"The cost of running our "A" team varies between £80-£12^ a week. This works out at approximately £3,000 per season and where you are stretched to the limit to pay first team expenses and all incidentals this extra burden is more than a headache.

"One has to admit that our "A" team is a must. A number of years ago we opted out of the Yorkshire Senior Competition for one season — we learned our lesson the hard way.

"In the affluent society of today it is asking the impossible for a player to play simply for the love of the game. You may get the odd one or two, but no more."
